When lockdown ends we will be ready. We will still be here, Yma o hyd.




MEET THE COMMITTEE. Snap shot from a Zoom meeting

As you may be aware, the Committee has been meeting regularly on Zoom throughout this lockdown period and one of the more tricky issues we have discussed, is how to keep our members interested and abreast of any developments. One of the biggest problems we faced was looking for ways in which we could keep in touch with members and also get feed- back from them. So, we decided to issue a questionnaire in order for the Committee to get members thoughts and feelings on a number of aspects of our choir life.

36 questionnaires were sent out with a stamped address return envelope. 26 were returned (Not sure what happened to the other 10) and a number of interesting and constructive points were raised in those replies.

It was encouraging to see that in most cases the response was very positive. Members felt happy with the choirs progress, the Committee's structure and the feedback they had. All felt that the music team were a valued and treasured asset to the Choir's development. There were a number of opinions as to the choir's choice of music with some wanting more modern songs whilst others were concerned with the difficulty in learning the welsh songs. Generally most were happy with our repertoire.

All members were positive regarding our venue at the club and the amount of practice undertaken. There was a call for more social events whilst there was an even split in the response to our concert schedule with half wanting more while the others were content with our existing schedule.

There were also constructive suggestions regarding recruitment and some valid points to the 'further comments' question.

All in all this appears to have been a worthwhile exercise and therefore the Committee have decided to raise some of the relevant suggestions for further discussion by all members in the forthcoming AGM (Date to be verified)
